




Our playground filled with families and friends

The choir took part in the world premiere performance of "It Takes a City", an operetta which celebrates the life and diversity of Coventry and even includes a song about the infamous ring road! The performance, which was enjoyed by His Royal Highnesses The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, celebrated the end of Coventry's City of Culture together with the Queen's Jubilee, and Commonwealth Games.

Rehearsals started in January. Thirty-five students met every Friday after school to learn their part in the mini operetta. The student's commitment and focus in rehearsals was fantastic.

On the day of the performance, we met at 8:30 ready to travel to London. A quick stop for lunch then onto the Royal Albert Hall for rehearsal. The students experienced working with a large choir, professional singers, a conductor and a live orchestra and were brilliant throughout the trip. Some of their parents and families had even travelled down to be in the audience for what was a very special performance. After the end of a long day many of the students shared it was 'their best day ever'.

Commonwealth Games Project

As part of our ongoing work with the Commonwealth Games and our partnership with Zambia, we were given the opportunity to perform a Zambian inspired piece at the official opening of Coventry Train Station.

Our Zambian choir recorded a welcome song alongside our partner schools, Earlsdon and Moseley Primaries. Our students then had 3 days of intensive rehearsals with global performance company, Highly Sprung. The students worked exceptionally hard to create their own piece of theatre/dance based on the theme of welcoming people to the city. On Saturday 7th May they performed their piece twice to sell out audiences. They did a brilliant job, and we were very proud of them.







Our Sports Changemakers have been preparing hard to act as hosts at our Commonwealth Sports Championships which will be held at Warwick University in June. They received a training session delivered by Commonwealth athlete Liz Johnson, who commended them all

for their ideas, positivity and leadership. They will next be leading a session at Corpus Christi Primary School to teach them about sports and gamesmanship!!

Forest Schools

Our newest batch of intrepid adventurers have started to hone their survival skills with myself and Miss Over in our weekly sessions. We have been slightly affected by the adverse weather, but the show must go on! We particularly enjoyed our lesson on fire starting! The FatFace Sustainable Bag Challenge

End of March and beginning of April 2022: we - a group of six year 7 and 9 student reporters- got involved in a national competition focusing on bio-degradable bags for clothing delivery around the world. The idea franchise was from FatFace - a British clothing and accessories retailer.

More specifically, FatFace's aim was to encourage secondary school students all over the UK to come up with their own sustainable solutions for the packaging. The ones who were short-listed would present their ideas to the judges of FatFace and Miss Hannah George - Delivery Partner of the national charity Speakers for Schools. The date for this second and final round was Friday 29th April 2022.

We were amongst the chosen teams for this 2nd round [⊙].



Looking back at the journey we went through...

It was obvious that we had to juggle between lessons to find time to do the preparation properly. Encountering a few distractions was smoothly dealt with and on we went! We spent time focusing on the current development in the field of bio-plastic, biodegradable bags and the main activities of FatFace.

As students, we all knew that it was a privilege to be trusted to be out of lessons and do research for the competition. We needed to make it work for the whole team.

Did you know that FatFace has donated over a million pounds to various charity events and some financial rewards will be given to the lucky winners of this opportunity?

Thursday 7th April: we finished the filming for our short video clip so that it could be submitted before the deadline date. It wasn't easy to work on the storyline within the time frame of 90 seconds for the clip. Our solution was to find an alternative to plastic bags that would keep FatFace products in the best condition whilst being kinder to our planet ©.

21st April **2022** – final days of Easter break: the news that our entry was shortlisted! There were only 4 hectic school days to prepare for the live presentation on Friday 29th April! No pressure at all ©

An announcement was made by our teacher Mrs Nguyen in the Monday morning staff briefing that our entry video was shortlisted for the last round of the project. YAY!

29th April 2022 – The D-Day of the 2nd phase

1:05pm - The event was held on a secure Google Meet link, accessed via Google Classroom. We came up with three main points:

- Our specific solution on how biodegradable bags could be produced, transported, used and returned to FatFace.
- Ways to get communities engaged in the solution. What we meant here were communities
 of FatFace customers; workers of FatFace from cheaper labour countries and other potential
 FatFace users.

- Lastly it was about the sustainability of our solution suggestion, including promoting the use of bio-degradable bags through the voice of young people like us.

25 minutes since the camera linked to Google Classroom was on ended within a blink of a human eye! Within seconds, we stood up and hugged each other. The presentation went so well for all of us. Everyone tried their best. We were on the high!

We all listened attentively when the judges shared their feedback with us including the remarks that our presentation was intelligently organised and well spoken. They also said that our content was 360 -degree view which was phenomenal!

Reflection

Once the presentation ended within seconds and the Google meeting switched off, the pressure was lifted, a feeling of accomplishment filled our bodies and the giggles from the judges when we told them our team name of Whitley Academy Jelly-Swamps still resonates in our brains.

We all were rewarded with a massively delicious soft drink bottle with tropical fruit flavours. Our imagination took us to a massive oval table full of champagne and we were tasting... There were times some of us argued like "old married couples". However, we found ways to listen to each other and sorted out what we wanted to focus on. We helped and encouraged each other, every single meeting.

At the last minute before the live presentation, we had to make some last-minute change to the team member. It was stressful but we were all honoured to be there and be a part of the project.

Thursday 5th **May 2022:** The winner was chosen, and we were runners-up. It took the judges four working days to come up with a decision ©. As we impressed the judging board so much that each of us was informed, we would receive some goodie bags from FatFace. We did and our photos showed the moment of joy!

We want to thank the national charity Speakers for School and FatFace —our very own British clothing retailer for giving us this amazing opportunity. We now gain precious experience in doing research, choose the precise data, narrow it down and present it to the REAL people in the industry. THANK YOU!




On June 9th Mrs Scott led a trip to the Belgrade theatre for Highly Sprung's Changing Climates Festival. This is the second time that Lyng Hall has performed at the festival, and one of the best bits of the day was seeing how professional and confident in their performance the older students who took part last year were. They also did an incredible job of encouraging the younger students, many of whom were stepping on stage for the first time.



The day was filled with workshops that included puppetry and challenging films, produced by physical theatre companies. There was also an inspiring talk by Coventry-born Paralympic athlete Siobhan Fitzpatrick, who hopes to represent her country at the Commonwealth games in a few weeks time. Our students asked some very deep and interesting questions and learned a lot about resilience and turning weaknesses into strengths.

The students had devised their own performance across two days of workshops at school and they performed it brilliantly. In the second half they had the opportunity to watch Sprung Advanced, which is a company made up of young people from across Coventry and featured two of our own students for the first time.







Mental Health Awareness Week 16 – 20 May 2022



We recently celebrated our Mental Health Awareness Week at Pearl Hyde Primary School. As a school, we hold a high importance on the role that mental health can play with our staff and students. As such, we are very aware of ensuring that we positively identify what Mental Health is and how we can create our own support network.

In Years 5 and 6, we focused on identifying our mental health support network. We spent a large part of the week discussing what mental health is, how it can impact us and how we can work towards ensuring that we have positive mental health.

We discussed the fact that we all have a body, so we all have physical health, and we work hard to keep our bodies healthy. We then thought about how, since we all have very powerful brains at Pearl Hyde, we must all have mental health, that will need exercising in a similar way to our bodies. As a Phase, we discussed all of the things that we could do to ensure that we work hard to keep us mentally healthy. We focused on making sure that we get enough sleep, eat a healthy balanced diet, read our favourite books, watch our favourite shows, listen to music and the practise of Mindfulness. We really enjoy Mindfulness at Pearl Hyde, especially in Years 5 and 6. It felt a bit strange at first, being allowed to just stop, relax and focus on our breathing, especially whilst at school. However, we were soon able to notice that it made us feel really relaxed.

In order to celebrate our Mental Health, we created some artwork inspired by our mental health support network. We created Hot Air balloon portraits and then we wrote the name of every person in our lives that lifts us up. We joined these names together and this showed us that wherever we are, we are always supported by the people in our lives that care. We then coloured our art, using oil pastels. After this, we hung our artwork from the trees around our school grounds. This was so that when our parents came onto our playground to join in some mental health activities with us, they could see what we had produced.

To end the week, we practised some mindfulness in nature. We took off our shoes, on the grass, and we focused on breathing with our eyes closed, whilst listening to our surroundings. It felt like a really calm and happy way to end the week.











Exploring My Future Career Path The Opportunity with SfS VWEX



On Tuesday the 12th April 2022, I was awarded the opportunity to attend the VWEX (Virtual Work Experience), conducted by Air League and supported by the national charity Speakers for Schools (SfS). The event was named: "Soaring to Success: Aviation & Aerospace Careers Day" It was a bright day – the start of first week of Easter break, and the excitement lingered in the air as I waited for the

session to start; only one thought was on my mind since I had woken up: "When will 10 am arrive? It's so long to wait!"

Log-in was promptly at 9:45 am, for the work experience to start virtually over on Google Meet at 10:00 am, and we were given resources to look through. There was a table provided with an intriguingly supportive table guidance, on how to layer out a portfolio for the future. However slowly but surely, I started getting the gist of the task.

The session began with an Air League scholar informing us about the company profile and how they support young people in their career, as well as a case study of their success story – I knew from this very moment, that this work experience will be very insightful and helpful, therefore 'waiting' was off the dictionary for that moment.

Firstly, we welcomed a speaker from Eagle Eye Innovations, who spoke about their company, and how they aim their innovative employees to design and manufacture variety-purposed Drones and RPS (Remotely Piloted System). This company is indeed very clever and it gave me food for thought, on such a broad field of aviation.

Did you know, the CAA (Civil Aviation Authority) introduced the manufacture of Drones and RPS as a sector of Aerospace Aviation in the U.K in 2018?

Next session, we had two ambassadors representing the Department of Transport, which, in the aspect of aviation, focuses more on general aviation. This is a sector of aviation which is solely for personal leisure, such as private pilots, or gliding clubs, etc.

It was without doubt one of the most helpful sessions, because it was here that we found out various key potential volunteering opportunities which will help build our future career. Specifically, an example of this is the volunteered Gliding Winch Launch Control personnel. While there are also amateur simple volunteering tasks such as maintenance of glider crafts, both are equally respected on a portfolio for future job prospects.

After a quick short break, we had two speakers from British Airways, providing insights into apprenticeships and internships respectively. This session was thought-provoking and provided a look into future opportunities inside the Aviation industry. This session has made me realise a broad spectrum of available opportunities. It came as a shock, to be honest, as I did not know there were SO MANY pathways in the field of Aviation, this was an eye-opening session!

Later, there was a session with RAF representatives speaking about career pathways in the RAF, and then we had lunch break.

Because questions were riddling my mind, I finished my lunch in a mere 5 minutes, and came back to ask questions to British Airways representatives for the remainder of lunch break! It was indeed worth it, as my curiosity had been peaked and resolved as well.

The next two sessions were very interesting, as they were quite a unique reflection inside the field of aviation itself. The first one was by a UK space agency KISPE, in which the speaker, rather than providing this and that information, focused on the development of portfolio as a whole, mentioning things like soft skills, extra-curricular opportunities, things to show your passion, were recommended by the speaker; I found this really fascinating as this was a completely new take in this work experience, and I learnt a great deal in this session.

Do you know that KISPE is actually a project engineering, system design and implementation company, working in the space, telecommunications and electronics fields?

Following on, we had speakers from the CAA (Civil Aviation Authority), and this was, to me personally, the best session in this work experience. We received fresh information, new opportunities, clear potential ideals, and different pathways to consider! I enjoyed this session immensely.

And finally, we got to hear another lovely and inspiring story from an Air League scholar, and how she was successful in the aviation industry. To wrap everything up, we had the opportunity to ask questions. As usual, I had a lot of questions, and the session went 15 minutes over, while the majority of the other participants had already left! When reflected back upon this, I am extremely grateful for Mrs Nguyen and Speakers for Schools to provide me with this opportunity through Air League, because I have learnt so many new things with this work experience. As mentioned earlier, it was indeed an 'eye-opener'; I now feel one step forward towards my career goal...

UK Junior Maths Challenge... The Results

On April 28th a number of pupils from years 7 and 8 took part in the UK Junior Maths Challenge. The Junior Mathematical Challenge is a 60-minute, multiple-choice competition aimed at **students across the UK**. It encourages **mathematical reasoning**, **precision of thought**, and **fluency** in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The problems on the Intermediate Mathematical Challenge

are **designed to make students really think** in a problem-solving manner. The top 50% of pupils in the country are awarded bronze, silver and gold certificates with the top 8000 pupils going through to further follow on rounds.

A big congratulations to Wen we are so proud of his achievement.


Wen said "I really enjoyed the Maths challenge and was very proud to have got through to the next round. I look forward to completing the next challenge soon."




What do you see when you look at a tree? By Emma Carlisle




I am Nefertiti by Annemarie Anang




A Flash of Fireflies by Aisha Bushby

also learns that every fairy tale has a dark side. And there are terrifying creatures that lurk in the shadows . . .






The Clockwork Queen by Peter Bunzl
