We are Lyng Hall - The Moral of the Story



Mr Green has talked about the following scientific experiment many times - I was reminded of it when I saw Mr Ahbedin's assembly. It is about a flea in a jar!



The experiment involves placing fleas into a glass jar and observing their behaviour. When the jar lid is open, fleas easily leap beyond the height of the jar. The approximate height a flea can jump is somewhere between 15 cm (5.9 inches) and 25 cm (9.8 inches). This is more than 100 times their own height.

When the lid is closed, the fleas initially leap and crash into the lid but finally learn to jump to a height slightly lower than that of the lid to avoid crashing.

When the lid is reopened, the fleas have already adjusted to the new height and do not leap beyond the height of the jar, even though they can. Even the offspring of these fleas follow the same behaviour and do not jump beyond the height of the jar.

This ties in very closely with the theme of the assembly - if we believe that there is a limiting factor - there will be one and often we put that limiting factor on ourselves.

In school, it is about believing in your ability to learn and believe you can be even better.

And finally the MAYBE'S.



<u>College – Update</u>



Griffin are still leading the way with an average total of **411 points** per pupil. **7M** are currently their top performing tutor group whom also received double points last week for scoring zero negative points for the entire week. Despite Griffin's first place position, they actually had the lowest performance in terms of their attendance, punctuality and negative points last week. Could this change their position in the league before we reach half-term?



Pegasus have remained in second place for a number of weeks now, falling short with an average total of **372 points** per pupil. **9R** are currently their top performing tutor group. Last week, **9I** and **11M** gave a particularly good performance with zero negative points and therefore received **two double-points awards** for their college. Pegasus also had the lowest number of negative points last week, so earned themselves **1000 bonus points**.



Centaur are currently resting in third place with an average total of **325 points** per pupil. Despite having the **best punctuality score** last week, they didn't quite manage to move up to second place. **10I** are currently their top performing tutor group and last week, **9M** and **11R** made excellent contributions with the **double points award.** Centaur presently have the lowest number of postcard nominations - could this be the main factor holding them back?



Dragon currently have an average of **298 points** per pupil with **70** being there top performing tutor group. **7I** and **110** earned them the **double points award** last week. Despite sitting in fourth place, Dragon's **'Top 10'** pupils actually have the highest number of positive points in the entire school! Additionally, they are all part of the **1000 points club** and **bronze badge** holders!
