Dear World,

Remembering the Holocaust is important because it is a way to honour those who lost their lives to such tragedy. It is a way to learn from atrocities. It was a dark period in history. During this time, innocent lives were lost, families were lost and unimaginable



suffering occurred. By understanding the factors which cause the rise of hatred, creating a fertile ground for extremist ideologies to grow, we can better defend the values that matter.

John Fieldsend's life was enabled through the rescue of the Kindertransport. His journey has since been made into a film, One Life, featuring Anthony Hopkins as his rescuer. After he visited school, we went to the cinema together to experience this interpretation of his life. It was an emotional, and powerful, afternoon.

We are Lyng Hall - UK Maths' Challenge

This month, a number of pupils from year 11 took part in the UK Intermediate Mathematical Challenge online. The Math's Challenge is a 60-minute, multiple-choice competition aimed at students across the UK. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The problems on the Intermediate Mathematical Challenge are designed to make students really think in a problem solving manner. The top 50% of pupils in the country are awarded Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates.

The results are in.....

We have a fantastic set of results, many students achieving in the top 50% nationally. 19 of our students achieved a Bronze, Silver or Gold Award, and 2 of the students, A M and Jacob Martin, have been invited to the next round of competition at Pink Kangaroo. Great effort by all, well done on the awards!



We are Lyng Hall - Times Tables competition



Last week pupils across KS3 were tasked with competing in a national Times Table Rockstars competition. From the 14th to the 16th November pupils had to gain as many points as possible by completing as many correct times table answers as they could using any of the game modes.

Lots of schools, classes and ultimately pupils took part.

Did you know






College - Griffin


In the prime of life, I stood proud and strong, my branches a canvas for the


