The group has decided to achieve one Accept and Respect activity every month.


The calendared events coming up are:




### **Taste Test - Student book exchange**

During the month of March, we are encouraging as many students as possible to speak about a book they have read in their own time. Students whom go directly to Miss Odams, Mr Smith or Miss Hagan, to talk about a book they have read in their own time, will receive a college postcard and bonus college points. —This could make a real difference to the current standings!

### Did you know, reading habits assist students in learning more?


Research shows that there is a direct link between reading comprehension and academic performance. This means that pupils who choose to read regularly, will not only develop better literacy skills but, will also perform better in their GCSE's in comparison to pupils whom do not read very often.

### **Reading in Tutor-time**

Reading has become a key component in our tutor programme and provides pupils with a dedicated time to simply read. During this time, pupils have the opportunity to read aloud and gain 1:1 support with their reading. Previously collated student-voice showed that for some pupils, this was the only time that they actually read out-side of lesson time. Consistent reading, over-time, will not only make accessing the learning across all lessons much easier for students but, will also support them in developing their vocabulary and improving their writing skills - all very beneficial factors that will help pupils through their GCSEs and examinations.

**Take home the message** - Reading has huge benefits. It improves academic performance by making learning easier! Whenever you get chance (on the bus, waiting for dinner to cook, before you go to bed, early to a lesson) pick up a book and read it!


**Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> March -** there is a bake sale at breaktime, so make sure you bring some money!


