I am pleased to report that we raised £168.75 for our Non-Uniform day today which we will be donating to the charity SENSE to support the wonderful work they do.



# We are Lyng Hall - Warwick University/10M

#### Partnership with the University of Warwick - Creative Interpretations of Christmas Carol

Students in 10M have had a range of wonderful opportunities to deepen their understanding of who Dickens was, why he wrote and what London was like at the time he was living. On Monday 18th March, they had the opportunity to share what they had learnt and it was a wonderful event which celebrated their understanding through music, dance, drama, creative writing, art, science investigations, just to name a few.

We welcomed Dr. Jen Baker (Assistant Professor in C19th and C20th Literature) and Charlotte Pearce (Widening Participations Officer) from the University of Warwick. Alongside students' families and teachers, the students performed with skill, confidence and passion. We are incredibly proud of them.

#### Dr. Jen Baker shares her thoughts:

"This was an excellent afternoon that showcased not only what had interested and inspired the pupils from their studies, but in turn inspired the audience with the variety of mediums they used to express themselves. I enjoyed the range of approaches, from the scientific analysis, to performance pieces, to illustration and visual representations and commend the research and heart that went into each piece. Both independent work and group work was showcased with care and respect that was wonderful to witness."

#### Mrs. Smith shares her thoughts:

"School life is busy and moments like this are a real moment to reflect on how special the interpretation of students are. How impressive. New interpretations - the muppets, a financial conundrum, Dickens' life, art instillations, art itself - beautifully presented, poetry, dance. Creativity - the ability to think and present as though someone else. Important for literature, but also important for life - we are a kinder society if we think of the pathway and journey if others."

#### Miss. Hagan shares her thoughts:

"I am incredibly proud of the dedication of 10M. They have worked so hard throughout our study and actively engaged with all of the generous opportunities that the University of Warwick provided. It was enriching to watch their creative responses and it has had a significant impact upon their written outcomes for this unit."

#### Reading for Pleasure—Enrichment Opportunities in English

For March, we have hosted **World Book Month** and the students have had a range of opportunities to engage with reading in different ways - some of these workshops were led by our own KS4 students and I am incredibly proud of the responsibility, resilience and ability they showed.

#### **UKLA Shadowing Book Awards:**

We have had a partnership with UKLA for three years and it is a wonderful space for students to experience new books that offer new voices, share journeys from around the world and enable students to have a chance to be judges themselves.

Our **Y10 UKLA Shadowing Book Club** have spent the last 4 months reading the longlist of 25 books—each Tuesday lunchtime we meet in W14 to discuss the books we have read, and consider the value of sharing these books with other students. On Tuesday 19th March, this group led their own Shadowing Book Club—it was a wonderful atmosphere with lively discussions. We look forward to welcoming Y9 into our UKLA book group. Students share their thoughts:

"It is important to hear what students enjoy and what they can relate to."

"It allowed me to have intriguing conversations with other students that have a passion for reading."

"The experience enabled me to understand the role of a teacher, the determination needed and supported me in developing my ability to communicate and understand others."

#### **Critical Readings of Translations Workshop:**

Dr. Caroline Summers, Assistant Professor in Translation and Transcultural Studies at the University of Warwick, has been working with our year 10s over the past four months. Amongst them they speak 13 languages, and they have had the

opportunity to explore and critically discuss a range of translated texts on varying themes. It has been a challenging, and engaging, environment for them to explore the importance of language and the importance of translation in opening up conversations about different cultures, perspectives and worlds.

On Tuesday 19th March, they took on the challenge of leading critical discussions with Y8 on their favourite translated works.

"I learnt that there are many perspectives of multiple cultures of one text and that can influence the views we form of it."

"Learning in a different environment, from our peers, was a great opportunity."

"Today's workshop was valuable because it is important to see the world from someone else's eyes, to know the difference between yours and their opinion."

"Having the chance to deliver this workshop provided space for me to lead a group and enhance my own literacy skills in the process."

#### World Book Month—Values Workshops

In the afternoon of Tuesday 19th March, students from Y7-10 had the opportunity to select from four different workshops. These were hosted by staff from across departments who wanted to share their love of reading, and to share the different values that can be taught through our experience with Literature.

#### Student voice:

"In this lesson I learned about how you shouldn't take for granted, the time you spend with someone you love and that words can have a deeper meaning than you think."

"This lesson we have learnt that memories are powerful and can have a massive impact on peoples' viewpoints."

"I enjoyed how we learned how to use landscape to create the mood of our story and how we got the chance to create our own stories using the new skill."

"I loved how open this session was."

"I would like to see more workshops based off real people and events."

"I enjoyed how we all talked about how passionate your book is."

Each of the workshops created safe spaces where we could talk about reading in a different way.



#### Empathy Workshop – When Night Falls Miss. Hagan is going to share with you her

published book. We will discuss how writing can be used as a way to process challenging experiences, and you will have a go at imitating the style.



#### Determination Workshop – Illuminated Ink

Mr. Abhedin will look at illustrated prints with you, and you will explore the role of art in story telling. Together you will create your own illuminated illustration which will become a feature within the school.



#### Resilience Workshop – Beyond a Paperback

Mr. Loach-Smith is going to share with you creative ways to think about reading. If is not always easy, what are other ways we can experience reading? Where can we find reading beyond a book?



#### Responsibility Workshop – The Criminal Mind

Miss. Odams and published author Mr. Gordon are going to teach you the art of profiling and how this can then be developed into the crime genre. Will you be able to build a tale that will leave the reader questioning?

"You can use your imagination and be creative"

"It helps me understand how to write books"

"I loved it when we had the creative freedom to write about the profiles"

"We would like to hear more of Mr Gordon reading his books in the future, it was nice hearing a published story written by one of our teachers"

"It has developed my understanding of reading for pleasure as I now know how much work writers put into their work and can appreciate it more when reading something".

"I don't really read much, but Crime stories are something I would like to read more about"

"I realised not many people read for pleasure, but I do and now know other ways I can read"

"It made me think about characters backstories and character motivation"

We have received some beautiful stories, and book recommendation chains, from tutors. We look forward to sharing these with you in a future newsletter.




### College – Update
