Our Reflections on the Conference

Being a UNESCO Ambassador means you learn about significant events in our collective timeline. It means you are a supporter or representative for the values that are important to our society. We chose to be ambassadors since we believe it is good to learn about the complexity of these events, and how they shape our world now. Being a UNESCO Ambassador also provides us with many opportunities to meet amazing people and to go to significant places that should never be forgotten. One of the privileges of being an ambassador this year has been learning about events like the Coventry Blitz and The Holocaust.

In July we had the opportunity to present all of the projects we had done as UNESCO ambassadors in Coventry Cathedral, this included: our trip to the Old Cathedral, interview with a Holocaust Survivor and a multitude of other writing tasks and art pieces. We presented them on display boards colour coded by the 4 categories they fall under: learning to be, learning to know, learning to do and learning to live together.

We are Lyng Hall—Biology Field Trip

Students from our year 13 A-level Biology cohort were escorted to Coombe Abbey to complete their PAG 3; Sampling Techniques. The assessment of practical skills is compulsory and appears on students' certificates alongside the overall grade for the qualification. They studied the distribution and abundance of plants in habitats (aquatic and land based) using a number of measuring techniques. The session was run by a graduated masters student from Lincoln university, who had put together a bespoke session based on the sampling techniques required for the completion of PAG 3.

Initially, the students sampled a grass based "plane field" in which quadrates were placed using random number generation. Students identified different species of plant and established the abundance and diversity of plants sampled. The field is regularly maintained and used for human activities and as such is a controlled area.



Subsequently we moved to the second sampling area; Meadow lands. These meadow lands are free to develop, away from human intervention and as such have different species and the students studied if this results in a smaller or larger species diversity.

As in the previous field, the quadrates were placed at random and species counted that were encountered in the meadow land area. Following statistical analyses, on benches in the open air, using the Simpson's index of species diversity, the students established the "Meadow land" area has a higher species diversity then the "plane field" and that it contained different vegetation.

We are Lyng Hall - Biology Field Trip

Sampling technique 2, practical 3, involved using an interrupted belt transect sampling. This method of sampling is ideal for investigating the progressive change in the distribution and abundance of several plant species in a habitat. The gaps in the tree growth on the edge of the field resulted in a differential exposure to sunlight. We investigated if this had an effect on the abundance of plants along a hundred metre transect line with sampling every 10 metres. The results need further analyses (plotting and linking to features of the habitat) at this point but there appeared to be a relationship between the positions on the transect line and the level of tree growth on the edge of the field.



Finally, we measured the diversity of species based on the sampling depth in a pond in Coombe Abbey. Students were introduced to the correct way to gain valid samples and minimise the disruption to pond life and safe return of the captured species to the pond. Next, the students gathered their samples and identified the species using a reference chart after which the species abundance and diversity at different levels of the pond was assessed. The results showed a clear differential expression of pond life dependent on sample depth with the larger more complex species mainly found near the bottom of the pond.

I would like to thank our pupils for the fantastic application to the sampling and analyses of the data and the excellent atmosphere maintained throughout the day. In addition, I would like to express my thanks and complements to the staff at Coombe Abbey for an excellent educational trip for our sixth form students.

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
