Cathedral Ruins.


Under the black sky of November, Coventry burned, its heart split open, its streets made of ashes. The cathedral stood defiant, its walls falling stone by stone, its silence broken.

Students with Our Chair of Governors, Ghulam Vohra, MBE

On Tuesday 12th November, we were invited to the Interfaith Conference at Coventry University. Our ambassador team was superbly represented by Emmanuel Dampare and Julien Quesney. During the afternoon, they were involved in a series of workshops with sixth formers from different schools across Coventry. They were challenged to think about how they could be initiators of social change within our community. In the months to come, we will share the growth of this project.

In the evening, hundreds of members of the SACRE community arrived and both boys presented—on behalf of all the young people—their thoughts on the afternoon's workshops.

On behalf of Ghulam Vohra (Chair of Governors), and the governing body: "The Seeds of Hope event at school on 11th November, and the Interfaith Conference at Coventry University on 12th November, were fantastic. I am so proud of our pupils and this was mentioned by all the speakers including the Minister Lord Khan."

A member of the wider community present at the Interfaith Conference on 12th November contacted the school personally to express their thoughts:

"Yesterday evening I attended an interfaith event at the University of Coventry. Some of your students had attended the afternoon session and two of them, Emmanuel Dampare and Julien Quesney, stayed on afterwards for the evening session and gave a resume of what they had gained from the afternoon session. I am emailing you to express sincere admiration for these two boys - they presented themselves so incredibly well and the content of their talk was amazing. 









COLLEGE POINTS PER PUPIL
