They ably led workshops on Peace and Reconciliation. Students engaged in poetry and art work – focusing on the voice of Coventry Cathedral in the Coventry Blitz and its place in our story of remembrance. They all worked with passion and creativity; the collective pieces produced were inspired.

Miss Jolley, English Lead: "The children love working with older children as they don't usually get to do this. They loved working on their WW2 topic before Christmas, and this project allowed them to recall and expand their ideas. The vocabulary they were coming up with was wonderful!"

"It was great to go back to my own primary school. The theme reminded me how much I have learnt; how different things are and what things will be in the future. I liked giving back to the community which helped me."














# We are Lyng Hall—P16 Enrichment Opportunities

#### **Our Bryson Excursion to Sheffield**

Our Y12 A-Level English group journeyed to Sheffield to put into practice their work with Bryson's travel writing and to see their exam text live: Williams' 'A Streetcar Named Desire.'

The day began bright and early at 7.30am for the long journey north in our trusty mini-bus. We began with a sunny walk through Western Park (see photographs in the right column); before absorbing the Literary treats of La Biblioteka. We reflected on the cultural offerings of the Identity display in the Graves Gallery and the microclimate of the Winter Gardens; before enjoying an afternoon in the Crucible Theatre.

Mrs Cockrell: "What a truly lovely day exploring Sheffield. The students were really engaged throughout the day exploring the art of travel writing and orienteering as we visited various sites before a trip to the

theatre. The students have come a long way as they have built team work skills."



#### TIRAH Talks—Partnership with The University of Warwick

The TIRAH Talks programme has provided an opportunity to participate in critical discussions, develop independent research and ultimately to prepare for a formal presen-

tation on campus.

This year's project was "Social Media as a Form of Activism" and we are incredibly proud of how hard they all worked.

On Monday 28th April, students travelled with Mrs. Cockrell to The University of Warwick to deliver their final work.

Mrs Cockrell: "The students demonstrated exceptional skill in presenting their research, engaging with the audience with confident delivery and well-researched content—something which is unfamiliar to them. It was clear time and effort was put into their collaborative and independent work. The students should be truly proud of themselves!"

Student reflections: "Warwick University was a calm yet strong environment, due to it being exam season you could see a lot of people around. The location was like a mini city. On the tour, we saw many of the buildings which each have their own identity. Having the opportunity to deliver our presentations was enriching; the review we received was clear and informative. It was all well-explained making me feel like I had improved on my presentation skills."

"I'm excited to share that I recently had the incredible opportunity to present my speech on social activism at Warwick University. It was an unforgettable experience that not only allowed me to share my passion but also helped me grow personally and professionally.








# College – Update
