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In recognition of the speeches delivered by Emmanuel and Julien at the SACRE conference in November, we were invited to a special event in London, at the invitation of Lord Khan, Minister of Faith.

During this visit students had the opportunity to observe the House of Commons in action—Ed Miliband fiercely debating how we will reach Net Zero. Working alongside other schools, they then participated in a Poetry Activism workshop at The Surveyor's House, before returning to Parliament for an audience with Lord Khan in the House of Lords. We were additionally joined by our Coventry South MP—Zarah Sultana.

At Surveyor's House, I led a poetry workshop with the different schools. Students were given a range of different prompts. Each encouraged them to consider the importance of faith and identity; but more significantly how our voices could be used to be activists of changed. They were challenged to create pieces that promoted inclusive and safe spaces—we look forward to sharing how this project will feature in our city's community.

But only through the devotion of us as a united force can the rupture be healed. We need to have collective faith that although the perception of young people is in a precarious position, we have the power to renew this image. 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"When we all went to visit Parliament in London, it was a very exciting experience. An opportunity for us to see it for ourselves in real life, and even witness a live tv debate. This was a very interesting experience, speaking to members of the Parliament and hearing what they had to say and even had the chance to ask them any questions we had for them. From that trip, we managed to grow our knowledge even further and understood different opinions about what it means to be a member of Parliament.

Lord Khan was here to answer any questions we had for him, and it was another opportunity to learn more from him after meeting him last time in November. It was not just about learning and our knowledge, but also a time of fun which we were able to take part in many activities.

We managed to write poems about different themes, some examples were light, cuts, belonging. Writing these poems allowed us to prepare ourselves to ask questions for Lord Khan and understand the true problems we are facing in this world, and ask ourselves questions that we wanted answered. Whilst going around Parliament, we got to have a tour and saw many parts of history and key figures. After asking questions to Lord Khan, we learnt that there are many problems Parliament is trying to solve and that it was not easy to do so. However, we also met MP Zarah Sultana, who was the first Muslim woman to be in Parliament. Although it an amazing achievement, we learned that she received hate. But even in hard times, she managed to persevere and fight for what she believes is right. Because of this, she is now a role model and an inspiring figure for all of us and someone many people look up to. It was a true inspiration to meet her and spend time with her. 
