
It is useful, when you are using numbers or figures in your everyday, making sure that your young adult sees how you deal with these situations and how you plan and budget.








# College – Update










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### How our school can support your family

### What happens if I don't want the help?

We want to work with your family and it's important we have your full engagement but you do not have to take the support that we are offering you, this is a voluntary process and you can tell us at any time if you no longer want the support.

### How will my information be shared?

You will be asked for your agreement for Early Help services to come together to support you and your family and to share relevant information to get the right help with the right people.

We will use your personal information so that we can provide the right advice and guidance and provide the help that you require as early as possible.
