

6th Cities of Remembrance Network – UNESCO Ambassadors' International Trip

Ypres and Dunkirk: 20-27 May 2025

Our UNESCO Ambassadors were invited by CAIF – Coventry Association of International Friendship – to the Cities of Remembrance symposium in Ypres and Dunkirk. In the 6 months building up to the trip, they were invited to explore the topic: 'Diversity of Remembrance.' This prompt created space to explore their own journeys, family, and heritage. We agreed upon the title 'Creative Tapestry' for our presentation to share how the project wove us further together as a group.

The Memory Cities network, officially created in Dunkirk in 2016, aims to bring together several cities around the world that have been heavily affected by the conflicts of the 20th century. The network currently includes 17 cities, such as Hiroshima, Bizerte, Krefeld, Gdansk, Oradour-sur-Glane, and Boutcha. This year's event coincided with the 80th anniversary of the Liberation of Dunkirk and the 85th anniversary of Operation Dynamo — this was the operation to evacuate a large number of British, French, and Belgian troops from Dunkirk, trapped by the advancing German troops. The various delegations explored key topics such as the rise of extremism, European engagement and citizenship, and current geopolitical events.

During the 8 days, alongside Political Delegates from around the world, our ambassadors engaged in a series of commemorative events for the 80th Anniversary: the arrival of the Little Ships flotilla and military vehicle exhibition; Commemorative ceremony in memory of the British servicemen who died in Dunkirk during the 1940 campaign; Visit of the Fort des Dunes Museum; Last Post Ceremony at Menin Gate; Official commemorative ceremony marking the 85th anniversary of the Battle of Dunkirk and Operation Dynamo; and a Symposium with 200 students from Dunkirk to address the issue of Far Right Extremism.

In this newsletter, our ambassadors share the impact of the visit with you

"To serve in the education profession is both a privilege and a responsibility. History warns us of the impact education can have. The classroom has more than four walls. It is an opportunity to give space for conversations with young people that can shape a tapestry in our future which is beyond lines of division, the tug of war of territory and the suppression of self. Diversity of remembrance is us acknowledging the different threads of the tapestry that creates the world's picture. This project enabled me to see the shared narratives I have with my students. Our families, at one point in time, fought on opposing sides of the same war. But our conversation, our journey together demonstrates the power of education to change futures; and the strength of young voices to elevate the possibilities of future generations. We are proud to belong to a school and city that are nationally recognised as places of sanctuary who place peace and reconciliation at the heart of what we do."

Identity - Eden

Being able to experience this is something I will be grateful for all of my life. Even though the main purpose of the trip was educational, it created many fun memories with the other ambassadors.

Throughout our time there we had the opportunities to meet and talk with delegates and representatives from around the world. Listening to them give speeches about how they want to counter far right extremism made me realise how much of a problem it's becoming in the world today. And then being able to speak with them afterwards about the state of the world and even just having casual conversations was helpful in furthering my understanding of how to better the world.

Each part of the trip helped me think about how as a person of youth I can try to make an impact on what the future can become.

Learning everything we did on the trip made me reflect more on my family's identity. Thinking about how my ancestors experienced the war, although not being on the front lines they went through many different kinds of hardships. Everything we heard linked to my family story and I'm extremely grateful to have learnt everything we did.

Remembrance - Daniel

I recently attended a symposium in Dunkerque that brought together young people, activists, and political leaders to confront one of the most urgent threats facing our world today: the rise of far-right extremism.

What became clear to me during those days is this: remembrance is not just about looking back it's about protecting the future.

Far right ideologies do not emerge in a vacuum. History shows us, again and again, what happens when hatred is normalised, when people are divided, and when dangerous ideas are left unchallenged. From the Holocaust to the Rwandan genocide, the signs were there - subtle at first until they became impossible to ignore.

Remembrance is how we keep those signs from being forgotten. It is our strongest moral compass. It reminds us not only of what happened, but how it happened how language was twisted, how communities were scapegoated, and how silence allowed cruelty to grow.

To remember is to resist. It's a refusal to let history repeat itself.

We, as young people, inherit these memories not as guilt, but as responsibility. When we remember the victims of hate, we honour them by speaking out against new forms of it whether

they appear in classrooms, online comment sections, or political speeches.

And Remembrance gives us context, clarity, and courage. It teaches us that extremism doesn't begin with violence—it begins with forgetting.







Reconciliation - Julien

Our trip showed us pain, trauma and suffering on all those who had to endure this war. We were given tasks to do and asked to do a 'scavenger hunt' and find certain buildings and statues and learn the meaning behind them. This told us about the history of Dunkerque and key individuals in its past and allowed us not only to learn about history but visit it. We also visited an expedition in a museum in Dunkerque where a man shared his heritage and what happened to his grandparents during the war. I had to translate what he shared with us as he was French, and because of that he managed to reconcile something with us because it was so important to him. After that there was a parade and the "Little Ships Flotilla" which included boats sailing across Dunkerque with music to remember operation Dynamo which was an important moment in the war. We also went into a symposium where the delegates of cities in other countries spoke together, and despite their differences this showed how those countries managed to reconcile with each other.

Heritage - Daria

Heritage. We were able to see the flotillas, a boat parade that is passed down through generations in Dunkirk to remember the things that happened long ago. We also visited a number of international cemeteries. This taught us to cherish our past, our heritage, and ourselves. I feel happiness when thinking about how that trip changed me for the better and made me want to learn more about my heritage and my family's story.

While we were in Dunkirk, we had the opportunity to listen to delegates from countries like Germany, Italy, Poland and even South Korea speak at a symposium with the topic being how to fight against farright extremism and growing hate speech as well as how to protect the youth from it. After the symposium, we spent some time speaking to the delegates as well as explaining to them what we as ambassadors do together as a group. During these conversations, I realised what an honour it was to speak to these people.

As a young person, I had noticed how not many people my age get involved with these sorts of activities. This made me feel like I belonged amongst all these people. We were the youngest people there and many of the delegates were willing to speak to us, find out who we were and find out why we chose to join this group. Every citizen protecting the jade land each one of us nickname earth.


Your mute facade does not aid in the fight for preservation; your silent persona only corrupts the memories that should be evolving us into a greater future.




We are Lyng Hall—Summer Activities








College – Update
