The legacy of the Sky Blues

Our Y10 students share an important narrative that captures the resilience, drive and rebirth that encapsulates our city. They witnessed a historic moment for Coventry City Football Club. We marked the day at school – with student and staff donning their shirts – and a sunny lunch spent on the field, with a penalty shoot-out and blue and white doughnuts. This article captures how our team resiliently fought to reach this climactic moment after 25 years.

Relegation (some of our staff body were there...)

Shockingly, Coventry City were relegated from the Premier League in 2001. They had a team that was made for the topflight like players in Mustapha Hadji and Gary MacAllister. They were thought to go straight back up, right where they belong, but how the Sky Blues were wrong. 2 11th place finishes followed by a 20th place finish. Coventry never looked threatening enough for the championship and that started the downfall of the city's footballing culture.



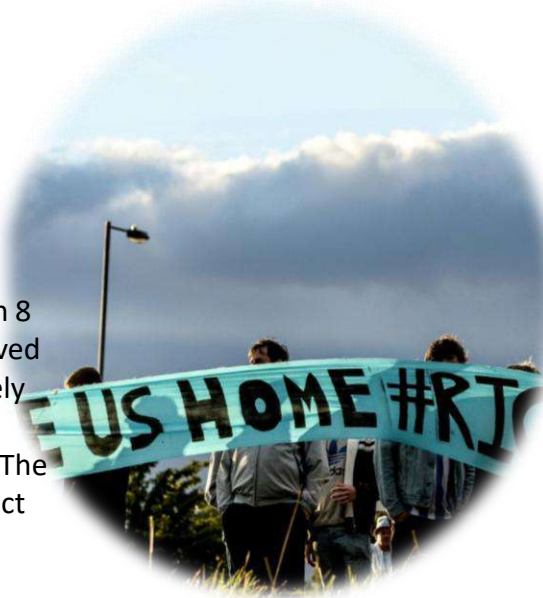
Slow collapse into the championship

Still surviving in the EFL Championship by the skin of their teeth, Coventry were taken over by business investment group, SISU. This was the beginning of what seemed like the end for the Sky Blues. Heavy debts remained while SISU were cutting costs from the football club furthering the team down the football pyramid. Not only that, but we left our once beloved home, Highfield road, a sad day for all Coventry fans. This led us to the Ricoh Arena and then 2012 soon hit leading to the inevitable relegation to league 1.



Ground sharing and administration

Coventry entered administration and received a 10-point deduction 8 months into the league 1 campaign in March 2013. The team survived countless times but eventually this hurt the team enough; effectively relegating them to league 2 in the 17/18 season. We had to groundshare at Northampton towns ground, the Sixfields stadium. The fans protested and funds weren't being paid. Exacerbated by the fact that the squad was constantly changing in league one before the relegation and it just wasn't clicking. League 2 football was on the horizon.



The Mark Robins' Era



In March 2017, former manager Mark Robins - who was at the helm from September 2012 and left in February 2013 to manage Huddersfield town - was reappointed to help with the dire situation. He soon became a club legend by securing the play offs and winning the playoff trophy to secure league one promotion. As soon as his appointment was made, he won the then known as 'Papa Johns Trophy'. Key players like Marc McNulty, Jordan Willis and Liam Kelly helped start the club's revival. Smart signings for cheap and strategic decisions in the higher ups started to unfold, with SISU slowly losing their place. After a few slow seasons in League 1, we soon got promoted back to the Championship after a 1st place finish in the early cut 19/20 season (due to Covid). Mark slowly cemented himself as a club legend.

Another ground share at St Andrews

More financial issues hit and Coventry were forced to play at St Andrews, Birmingham city's home ground. This hurt city's home advantage with the revenue, but Coventry were still promoted to the championship in the Covid season. This was a tough time for the home fans having to play half an hour up the road as they wanted to play at their home. This was proof that Robins was a certified manager for the level and surely could never be sacked.



Coventry 22/23 Miracle Season

This season started off as any other start to a Coventry season, we were winless in 7, picking up 3 points and looking to slip back into the habit of slow starts to the season. We then picked up a 1-0 home win against Middlesborough and from there it was only up. Until the New Year, City picked up 9 wins 5 draws and 4 losses to good sides. Towards the back end of this season, City were unstoppable - becoming unbeaten in their last 7 and before the 4-0 defeat to Stoke we were on an unbeaten streak of 9 games.

This spurred the Coventry fans to believe that this was the season they would become Premier League again. Beating Boro over 2 legs with a 1-0 win away from home sent Coventry to Wembley and we were 1 win away from the Premier League. On the 27th of May 2023, it was Coventry vs. Luton, Championship pof, the stage was set, who would step up?

Coventry went 1-0 down inside 23 mins and were trailing until the 66th minute when Gustavo Hamer, a now City legend, stepped up and scored the goal to equalise the tie. Cov fans were in dream land as we looked the better side going into extra time half an hour, Luton scored last minute however it was disallowed for a foul in the build up and then came penalties! Coventry heartbreak occurred as Fankaty Dabo missed his penalty - crushing the hearts of thousands of Sky Blues, in and outside of Wembley. This was what was needed for the team - Coventry's footballing culture hasn't been the same ever since, in a good way. We got the Phoenix fire in our belly.



Doug King Takeover

The 22/23 season was when we finally got rid of SISU and Doug King bought the club, that was the start of something special for the Sky Blues. The change of ownership brought improved attendances and the fans' relationship with the owners grew. This was widely regarded as what Coventry needed to gain off field, as well as on field, stability. Mark Robins immediately caught on, featuring in a chant to the song "I'm into something good". He has become a huge fan in recent times seen singing the club's anthem: "We Live And Die In These Towns".

In the 23/24 season, the Sky Blues finished 9th in the league with a poor end to the season, but that wasn't the highlight of the season. The real highlight of this season was the magical cup run, reaching the FA Cup semi final at Wembley.

Our road to the semi-final: Oxford at home 6-2 win, Kasey Palmer scored an absolute worldie of a goal to send us through to the next round. We then played Sheffield Wednesday away from home, which resulted in a 1-1 draw with the home side scoring in the last minutes of the game, sending it to a replay. In this game however, City's new at the time recruit, Victor Torp played and scored a beautiful goal on debut. We then played Maidstone United, who went on a magical cup run of their own beating Ipswich town 2-1 away from home, dispatching them 5-0 with Ellis Simms scoring a hattrick and Fabio Tavares scoring a brace.

Then the magic started, beating Premier League side Wolves 3-2. This game will live long in the memory for Cov fans as Ellis Simms and Haji Wright scored in the last minutes to beat the side. This then booked our place at Wembley for the 2nd year running. We then faced Manchester United at the home of football; we went 3-0 down inside of 58 minutes. Coventry then sparked a crazy comeback that no one saw coming: 3-1 thanks to Ellis Simms, many thought was a consolation goal but then 3-2 when Callum O'Hare scores a deflection. Then in the final minute of the game 90+5 minutes, Haji Wright scored a penalty past Andre Onana to secure extra time for the Sky Blues. Extra time was dull, both teams hitting the cross bar, but then again in the last minute of extra time, Victor Torp scored a goal that sent Coventry to the FA cup final for the first time since FA cup 87'! But then VAR stepped in and disallowed the goal by a margin on Haji Wright. Wembley heartbreak again - losing on penalties.



24/25 Heartbreak yet again

Coventry's 24/25 season was nothing but outstanding getting the play offs, but the start of the season was a nightmare turned dreamland for many Sky-Blue fans. We started the season poorly picking up only 14 points by November. Coventry lost to Derby 2-1 - the day after everyone found out that the club sacked Mark Robins, the man who got us into the place we were. Placed 17th in the league, we signed massive name, Frank Lampard, who many thought would flop but oh how they were wrong! He got the Sky Blues to the play offs again come the end of the season.

Everyone was loving Frank Lampard, and they finally thought this was the year. Social media regarded Coventry as 'next season FC' because they fell short in the play off semi finals to rival Sunderland, conceding in the Last minute of extra time due to an abnormal header. Coventry would come back even stronger making smart recruitments in the summer. This was the start of city's return to the Premier League.



25/26 Champions

This season was the start of something special, with Frank Lampard at the helm, Coventry started the season by buying their stadium and then on the same day beating QPR 7-1. Coventry couldn't stop scoring and found themselves top by Christmas only losing 2 games up until that point, after that Coventry soared until they reached the top.

“This was so fun.”

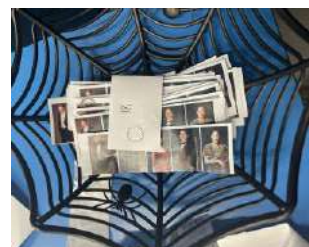
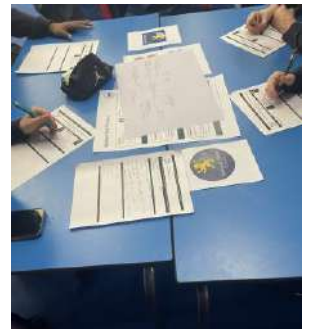
“I worked with people I’ve never worked with before.”

Introducing our new school counsellor

I have just joined Lyng Hall School, and I am extremely excited to get our counselling service up and running. I am a qualified counsellor specialising in working with children and young people.

Counselling provides a space to be heard, understood and explore your thoughts, feelings and experiences. Sometimes bottling things up can feel overwhelming and we can feel stuck with how we feel and unsure of what to do. Having a space separate from everyday life can sometimes make it easier to approach how we are feeling, or what is on our minds.

Young people access counselling for a wide range of reasons, including:

- self-esteem
- anxiety
- exam stress
- friendship difficulties
- bereavement
- low mood
- anger
- difficult life experiences



Counselling provides a confidential space to talk through your feelings, free of judgement and pressure. This means what we talk about in sessions stays private. Your safety is my top priority, therefore there are limitations to what information I can keep confidential. If you share details that raises concern for your (or someone else's) safety and wellbeing, I will need to share this information. This could be with our Safeguarding Team, parents and other children's services.

If you feel that you would benefit from our counselling service, please ask your Pastoral Year Co-ordinator to make a referral. Once a referral has made, we can have a chat to explore if counselling is right for you.

Some of our Y9 students had the opportunity to interview our new member of staff:

What is a counsellor?

Well, it is basically a person who can help you open up about your feelings and emotions so it can allow you to work better in school and help you feel better about yourself so a bit like therapy so you can understand yourself a bit better. Also, there are different types of therapy for example creative therapy which helps you talk about your feelings and what is making you feel a certain way but not just talking, you can use mood cards instead if you didn't want to necessarily talk about it. There are different ways you can talk about it without using words it also a good way if you're a creative person you can use those activities in the session to suit you so you can build trust with the councillor.

Why is it important?

She says working with young people is very important especially in secondary school as we are teenagers so it is the importance of knowing that you can express how you feel without having to worry about what others think about you, having a councillor allows you to have a safe space to talk about your worries or something that is keeping you down. If you are afraid to talk to the councillor in one of the first sessions, you just have to start a conversation and get to know each other so you can build trust to eventually open up in the sessions as it will just be you and the councillor so it is completely confidential in the sessions so there is nothing to worry about. In addition to this, she says her favourite part is just getting to know all the students that she meets just know that their doing well and that their ok.

Once again, the best thing about the session is that it is 100% private and confidential so there will be nothing to worry about even if you wish to share your views about other people in the school no one will know. As the councillor sessions are new to our school some of the qualities, she says which are needed for her to be in her job is to show empathy, to be understanding about different people's situations and basically getting to know them and making the experience enjoyable for them so they are comfortable talking to the councillor.
